

THINGS TO SEE & DO



1 ROMAN FORT Open daily 10-4.30

BEACHES

Visit the best preserved small Roman fort in Britain. It is the first evidence of military construction on our island and was originally built in the 4th century to defend the anchorage in Longis Bay harbour and the nearby Roman settlement. The site epitomises the way fortifications have been adapted and reused over the years. Tudors, British soldiers and even German soldiers have made this fort their base. There are story boards, an information room, a large WWII bunker and lots more to explore.



Discovered accidentally, and subsequently excavated by the Alderney Society in the late 1960s, this site consists of a dry stone wall measuring nine meters in diameter that enclosed a circular hearth and fire pit (radio-carbon dated to 490BC).

3 MANNEZ LIGHTHOUSE

Built in 1912 and rising 109ft, Mannez Lighthouse is a prominent landmark, on the north eastern coast. With a resident lighthouse keeper until as recently as 1996. the lighthouse now has LED lights and is controlled from Trinity House, Harwich.

6 ALDERNEY CINEMA

7 ST ANNE'S CHURCH

Designed by Sir George Gilbert Scott and consecrated in 1850, St Anne's Church has had many roles, from a garrison church for troops during the mid 19th century to machine gun post during WWII. Accessible from Victoria Street, this stunning church with a full peal of 12 bells, is well worth a

8 ALDERNEY MUSEUM

The award-winning museum provides a history of the island from the pre-historic period to the present day. Open April to October, by request at other times.

9 WATERMILL

Situated in the Bonne Terre valley the earliest record of the Mill is from the 1200's. The present building is an authentic rebuild of the 1792 mill which has been lovingly restored by Alderney Society volunteers for everyone to enjoy.

10 ROC A L'EPINE

Near Fort Tourgis an ancient burial chamber dates from 4,000 BC. Its top heavy flat stone rests on two supports.

11 'ALDERNEY BAYEAUX TAPESTRY'

Alderney residents created what could have been the missing final panel of the Bayeux Tapestry, using the same technique and materials of the original. It is displayed in the Library.

Built in 1809, this signalling tower was used to communicate vital information on the movement of French shipping with other Channel Islands during the Napoleonic Wars. It used Mulgrave's 'semaphore' system, a means of sending text-based messages across long distances through visual observation.

The British built 18 forts and gun batteries in the 1850s.

VICTORIAN FORTS

1 FORT TOURGIS

Completed in 1855, Fort Tourgis is the second largest of the forts. It was designed to mount 33 guns and accommodate 350 men. During WWII it became a powerful German defensive position. Interpretation boards are available on site.

2 FORT DOYLE Open daily 10-4 Fort Doyle is the smallest Victorian fort. It was completed in 1854 to house four guns and 22 men. It defended Crabby Bay to the east and Platte Saline to the west. In WWII it had two anti-tank guns firing east and

3 FORT GROSNEZ (No access)

Constructed between 1850 and 1853, Grosnez was the first Victorian fort to be completed, defending the breakwater works. During the German occupation it became Strongpoint Josephsburg with a Flak (anti-aircraft) Battery.

4 FORT ALBERT (No access)

Fort Albert was constructed between 1856 and 1859. It was originally named Fort Touraille but was renamed in honour of Queen Victoria's 'Prince Consort', Albert, upon his death in 1861. This fort was the last of the Victorian forts to be built on island. and thus the most modern in style.

5 FORT HOUMET HERBÉ (No access)

With its distinctive medieval look, Houmet Herbé was completed in 1854. It had ten guns and was manned by 61 men. Due to its location it was not used by the Germans

6 HOSPITAL BUNKER The Hospital Bunker was built for the German army by forced labour in 1943. There were beds for up to thirty patients, separate rooms for the doctors and medical orderlies, an admissions room and operating theatre capable of dealing with

7 PAK BUNKER

major injuries.

This bunker housed a 7.5cm PaK anti-tank gun. Originally the bunker was camouflaged as a house with a fake wooden roof and painted windows.

8 EVACUATION PLAQUE (Court House)

On 23 June 1940 at 6am, the church bells rang to notify islanders that six Royal Navy ships were approaching Braye Harbour to evacuate them to the mainland, with only hours to gather their belongings and assemble. They were not able to return to Alderney for over five years

9 WATER TOWER

Built as the headquarters for the Luftwaffe (German Air Force), the building, known locally as the Water Tower, dominates the skyline of St. Anne. The building formed a link in the German coast-watching surveillance of occupied Europe.

2 LONGIS ANTI-TANK WALL

3 LONGIS 'RUSSIAN CEMETERY'

This was the principal burial ground for foreign workers in Alderney. 381 bodies were exhumed in 1961 by the German War Graves Commission, most of whom were removed to the ossuary at Mont de Huisnes, France. The final number of deaths in Alderney will never be known and remains

Built by local residents on their return to the island this memorial commemorates the slaves and forced labourers, brought to Alderney by the Nazis during WWII, who subsequently died on the island.

5 BIBETTE HEAD

Bibette Head is the site of some of the most interesting and best-preserved German defences in the Channel Islands. With extensive interpretation boards, this site with its intact trenches, tunnel, armoured machine gun cupola and casemated gun positions offers a remarkable insight into the fortification of the island.
